We are People of Hope

Christians are people of hope. Christmas brings a message of hope into this chaotic and turbulent world, to this difficult moment, this frustrating hour in human history. Hope has triumphed before, it will prevail again! From a similar kind of world, writing to the people exiled from their devastated homeland, the Prophet Ezekiel presented a vision of healing, live-giving waters. That these waters would flow from a restored temple in Jerusalem, bringing fresh water to stagnant ponds alongside

which trees would grow whole leaves, would bring healing to the nations! (Ezekiel 47). These were prophetic and visionary words, bringing hope into a place of despair.

This kind of hope was birthed in an historical person in first century Palestine. The Jews were living under oppressive political and religious regimes, not unlike Taliban rule in Afghanistan today. Into this context God comes in Jesus Christ, bringing a message jam-packed with hope. It is the hope that comes from the creator God of the universe, reaching out in a very human way to connect with us. It is the hope of a better way of living demonstrated in the loving life and teaching of this God-Man Jesus. And it

is ultimately the hope of victory over sin, evil and death that came to us through the Easter events of death and resurrection.

In another dark time in human history, a man inspired by Christ brought hope to the people of the USA oppressed by shocking racial prejudice. One of the inspirational hopeful messages he gave included these words of ultimate hope to the people who marched with him from Selma to Montgomery in 1965:

Hope has

triumphed before,

it will prevail

again!

" I know you are asking today, 'how long will it take...? How long will justice be crucified, and truth bear it?' I come to say to you, however difficult the

moment, however frustrating the hour, it will not be long, because 'truth crushed to the earth will rise again....' How long? Not long, because 'no lie can live forever.....' How long? Not long, because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice."



The Cashmere Connection only comes out four times a year, but you can keep up-to-date with what is happening in our parish via the wonders of the internet!



Parish picnic celebrating the covenanting of Te Pohue Kawenata

On Sunday 29th October 2023 we were blessed with plenty of spring sunshine as we gathered with our parish, representatives of Te Rūnanga o Koukourarata, the QEII National Trust, members of the Mount Herbert Anglican parish and Banks Peninsula conversationists as well as friends and families of everyone involved in this project.

After four years we were able to finally admire the completed fencing that allowed this 47ha piece of land to be protected with the QEII covenant. The mixture of established bush beside the streams and in the valleys is framed by young trees and lower vegetation. Former pastures are starting to renature as the ecosystem strives to reestablish this very special piece of land. We felt an inherent peace that hopefully foretells how this covenant will serve our communities and the following generations.

Te Pōhue Kawenata reserve provides a glimpse into the miracles of nature, and God's presence can be felt by experiencing his creation here. This got very real for those who wandered into the wilderness, discovering the little waterfall, climbing steep erosion banks and reflecting on the beauty of the lush forest. The sense of companionship with each other was delightful.

A special thanks to everyone who made the trip out to Te Pōhue Kawenata above Port Levy, and for all the contributions to the speeches and picnic. We will long remember the spirit of love and fun evident throughout this wonderful day!

I am looking forward to seeing more visitors to Te Pōhue Kawenata experience God's peace in this unique place.

Chef Robert is often asked whether he has more than bakery items in his database of over 12,000 recipes. The answer, of course, is yes, so here is something savoury for you to try.

To Stew Beef (1804)

Take a piece of brisket of beef, four large onions, four carrots, four quarts of water, a bunch of sweet herbs, a little whole pepper; let it stand five hours covered down over a slow fire; take some of the liquor, let it be cleansed from the fat and thickened with flour and butter; add to this boiled carrots cut in slices, pickled cucumbers, and French beans; you may add walnut pickle, put your gravy that has been thickened, and your carrots, over the meat.


Helen Wells recently participated in one of these tours and here tells us about it.

One of the attractions in my choice to move to an Archer Retirement Village was their regular tour to Fiji described above. But you do not have to be an oldie to go on a Golden Oldies' Mission Tour. In August this year I joined 20 South Islanders (some of whom had been several times before) to see the dedication of local leaders making a difference in very challenging places, mostly around Suva where the infrastructure is not like the tourist world of the western side of the island. Regular trips over the past decade had meant good relationships had been built and we were able to take 300 kilos of the kinds of donations that we knew would be appreciated.

During our visit to the prison, we were encouraged to discover that, by applying Christian principles and ideas from Singapore, there has been a marked reduction in recidivism.

- * Along the way more discussions brought out the practical ways that project teams could be used. Already (!) there has been follow up to;
- * make coffins for the need and sales value of the squatter villages,
- * build fish farms,
- * a better kitchen for a church which hosts retreats, school sports teams coming to compete at the neighbouring arena, and which has been identified as an important evacuation centre, and,
- * after 5 years research, the production of mud bricks from local sources for cyclone-sturdy buildings and
- * re-builds in the face of sea rise.

My time in Vanuatu had already shown me the impact of enthusiastic work parties on short term trips, and I saw this in Fiji too. Knowing the responsibility that the Presbyterian Church has in Vanuatu and our special Cashmere connections, I hope a few of those interested can gather together to discover what we could do in our parish's GLOBAL mission. "This was a wonderful way to find the man behind the wonderful letters which have had such a powerful influence on the church."


"After watching these documentaries I wanted to read some of Paul's letters again."


Small group Bible studies are offered periodically at Cashmere Presbyterian. Do keep an eye on the church website, or contact the church office, if you would like to find out more.


